**The QuickLook:** The County continues with one of the highest unemployment rates in the State, ranking 53rd out of 58 counties. The preliminary July result is an decrease of 0.6 percentage points in the unemployment rate from the revised June rate. This preliminary figure is 0.6 percentage point higher than one year ago.

Overall, the County saw a decrease of 900 jobs in June following 2,600 new jobs created in June. The decrease was result of Local Government with 2,000 jobs lost, Durable Goods, Professional and Business Services and Transportation, Warehousing and Utilities, all with 100 job loses. Any substantial decrease in this area were offset by an increase of jobs in Total Farm (800 jobs), Food Manufacturing (500 jobs), and Wholesale Trade (100 jobs).

## Merced County Current Labor Force and Industry Employment

**The QuickLook At:** California's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 6.6 percent in July. This was down 0.2 percentage point from the rate in June and down 0.1 percentage point from one year ago. In comparison, the U.S. unemployment rate was 6.2 percent in July. This was down 0.2 percentage point from June, but up 0.4 percentage point from one year ago.

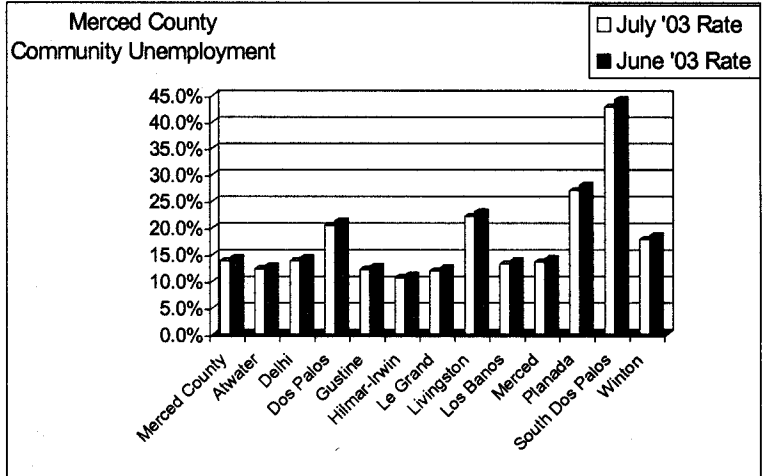
There were 14,431,700 jobs in total nonfarm industries (seasonally adjusted) in July, a decrease of 21,800 jobs from June. This followed a 6,400-job gain in June and a 13,400-job loss in May. In the first seven months of 2003, California's total nonfarm employment fell 33,200 jobs, for an average monthly decrease of 4,700 jobs. This compares to an average month-over increase of 600 jobs in 2002 and an average month-over decline of 21,200 jobs per month in 2001.

The actual California nonfarm job count (not seasonally adjusted) decreased 158,000 jobs in July. Within nonfarm industries, five sectors had month-over job gains and six sectors had month-over job declines. Job increases were recorded in construction (7,400), leisure and hospitality (2,700), information (1,800), financial activities (900), and natural resources and mining (600). Job losses were recorded in government (146,300), educational and health services (17,100), trade, transportation and utilities (2,900), professional and business services (1,800), manufacturing (1,800), and other services (1,500).

Average hourly earnings for California production workers in manufacturing were \$15.04 in July. Average weekly earnings were \$586.56, a decrease of \$14.64 from June. Average weekly hours decreased 1.0 hour to 39.0 hours, and average weekly overtime hours was 3.7, remaining the same as the prior month. (Data are not seasonally adjusted.)

**The QuickLook At: Sub County** average unemployment rates for the county, cities and municipalities saw an overall 0.6 percent decrease this month. All communities noted a decrease in unemployment, led by South Dos Palos with a 1.3 percent decrease. Livingston was close behind with a 0.9 percent increase.

**The QuickLook At The Seven Counties:** Merced County's workforce has grown over the past 20 years reflecting improvement of the County's economic well being; however, unemployment remains a consistent barrier to greater prosperity. Average Unemployment has fluctuated from a yearly low of 11.1 percent in 1988 to a yearly high of 17.1 percent in 1995. Between the years 1983 to 2002 Merced County's average unemployment was 14.3 percent.

The county's unemployment rate is the sixth highest in the state. San Benito saw the greatest decrease at 0.9 percent. Six counties' unemployment rate decreased in month-over average unemployment (Merced, Fresno, Madera, Mariposa, San Benito, Stanislaus). One county's unemployment rate increase in month-over averages employment (San Joaquin). Mariposa County's 0.5 percent decrease lowered its rate to below the state's unemployment (6.9%) for the third time this year.
